ADMISSION REGULATIONS

General admission regulations that apply to all prospective students

- The admission requirements and general information provided in this Faculty brochure are applicable to students who apply for admission to the University of Pretoria with a National Senior Certificate (NSC) or an Independent Examination Board (IEB) qualification.
- The following persons will be considered for admission to a first bachelor's degree at the University of Pretoria:
 - Candidates who have a certificate that is deemed by the University to be equivalent to the required National Senior Certificate (NSC) with bachelor's degree endorsement;
 - Candidates who are graduates from another tertiary institution or have been granted the status of a graduate of such an institution; and
 - Candidates who are graduates of another faculty at the University of Pretoria.
- Grade 11 results are used for the conditional admission of prospective students, but final admission will depend on the NSC (or equivalent) qualification and results.
- Candidates must also comply with the specific subject and achievement level requirements and the minimum Admission Point Score (APS) for their chosen degree programmes.
- The APS calculation is done by using the NSC 1 to 7 scale of achievement. It is based on a candidate's achievement in six recognised 20-credit subjects. The highest APS that can be achieved is 42. Life Orientation is a 10-credit subject and is excluded from the calculation when determining the APS. The following subject rating scores are used for calculating the APS for NSC/IEB:

- Except in cases where modules or programmes require the use of a language other than English, all modules will be presented in English, which is the University's official language of tuition, communication and correspondence.
- Minimum requirements for admission to the relevant programmes are set out in the application requirements table in this brochure.
- Meeting the application requirements does not guarantee admission into a programme.
- Applicants with qualifications other than NSC and IEB should refer to the following publication:

- School of Tomorrow (SOT), Accelerated Christian Education (ACE) and General Education Development (GED):** These qualifications are not accepted at the University of Pretoria.
- National Certificate (Vocational) (NCV) Level 4:** The University of Pretoria may consider NCV candidates, provided they meet the exemption for bachelor's status criteria and the programme requirements.

APPLICATION AND CLOSING DATES:

- Applications open on 1 April. All study programmes at the University of Pretoria are number-limited. You are encouraged to submit your application as soon as possible after 1 April.
- The closing date for applications for all UP study programmes is 30 June. This excludes the programmes in the Faculty of Veterinary Science which close on 31 May.

APPLICATION STATUS:

- Apply with your final Grade 11 (or equivalent) results.
- Applicants can expect feedback by September at the latest.
- Please check your application status and communication regularly on the UP Student Portal at www1.up.ac.za.
- Final admission will be based on the applicant's final school-year NSC or equivalent results.

ADMISSION REGULATIONS

Faculty-specific admission regulations

Applicants will be considered for conditional admission if space allows. A Grade 11 applicant must meet all the specific programme and APS requirements and must also submit their final Grade 11 examination results.

Final admission to degree studies depends on space availability. To qualify, applicants must meet one of the following:

- Have an NSC (or equivalent) with admission to bachelor's degree studies and meet the subject and APS requirements of the programme;
- Be a student transferring from another recognised tertiary institution and comply with the programme requirements of the chosen programme;
- Already have graduate status from a recognised tertiary institution;
- Be transferring from another Faculty at the University of Pretoria.

Applicants who are not South African citizens, or South African citizens with school-leaving qualifications other than the NSC (for example, qualifications from Spain, New Zealand, etc.), must obtain either a Complete Exemption Certificate or a Foreign Conditional Exemption Certificate. These certificates are based on the candidate's international qualification and can only be obtained from Universities South Africa (USAf) at www.mb.usaf.ac.za. In addition, such applicants must also meet the relevant programme admission requirements.



University of Pretoria programme qualification verification

The higher education sector has undergone an extensive alignment to the Higher Education Qualification Sub-Framework (HEQSF) across all institutions in South Africa. In order to comply with the HEQSF, all institutions are legally required to participate in a national initiative led by regulatory bodies such as the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET), the Council on Higher Education (CHE), and the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA). The University of Pretoria is presently engaged in an ongoing effort to align its qualifications and programmes with the HEQSF criteria. Current and prospective students should take note that changes to UP qualification and programme names may occur as a result of the HEQSF initiative. Students are advised to contact their faculties if they have any questions.

Bachelor of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology

The Bachelor of Arts in Speech-Language Pathology programme will help students acquire in-depth knowledge of normal speech and language processes within the framework of human communication (infants, children and adults).

Students learn about the causes and signs of speech, voice, language, listening and reading disorders. They also study the scientific principles behind assessing and helping people with these communication difficulties, or those at risk of developing them.

The programme also teaches students how to assess and treat swallowing and feeding problems (dysphagia) in clients of all ages. Therapy can take place one-on-one, in groups, as part of a team, or through community programmes.

Students gain practical skills in techniques to improve speech, voice, language and swallowing. The qualification meets international requirements.



Who is the ideal candidate?

The ideal candidate is someone who is:

- Interested in the social humanities
- Eager to improve people's well-being
- Able to help others communicate effectively

Candidates should be dedicated students who uphold the ethics of their future profession. Their main goal should be to enhance the quality of life of their clients and help them connect with others in daily interactions.

Shadowing a speech-language therapist at work is encouraged.



What makes this programme unique?

The programme offers high-quality theoretical and practical training by registered healthcare professionals. Students are registered as student clinicians with the Health Professions Council of South Africa (HPCSA), allowing them to provide speech-language therapy services while still undergraduates.

Depending on their academic performance, students may have the option to pursue a full-time master's degree after completing the four-year professional degree.

After graduation, students are required to complete one year of community service at a public healthcare facility employed by the South African Department of Health. This provides excellent clinical experience and gives graduates an immediate job and income opportunity.

Bachelor of Arts in Audiology

Audiologists provide patient-centered care in the prevention, diagnosis and (re)habilitation of hearing, balance and other auditory disorders.

The Bachelor of Arts in Audiology programme is aimed at acquiring in-depth knowledge of normal and pathological hearing and balance processes within the framework of human communication. In addition to theoretical modules, students do hands-on clinical training with patients (from infants to adults) in clinics, hospitals, schools and community outreach programmes.

The Bachelor of Arts in Audiology programme equips students with the knowledge and skills to assess, diagnose and manage hearing and balance disorders across the lifespan. Training includes audiological and vestibular screening, diagnostic evaluation, and evidence-based intervention (habilitation) conducted within multidisciplinary teams or through community-based programmes where students offer services to the public.



What makes this programme unique?

The Department of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology at UP is the first and only centre in Africa to become a World Health Organisation Collaborating Centre for the Prevention of Deafness and Hearing Loss.

The qualification's compliance with international standards makes graduates highly sought after locally and internationally.

Critical-thinking skills

Audiologists must critically analyse not only a patient's hearing/balance, but their unique circumstances to offer tailor made counselling and treatment plans. They must also be able to provide alternative solutions when patients do not respond to initial treatment.




Patience

Audiologists work with patients who may need a lot of time and special attention in order to understand why they experience certain difficulties, and how to move forward with intervention.



Bachelor of Arts

In the Faculty of Humanities, more students choose a Bachelor of Arts degree than any other programme. Its adaptability enables students to explore disciplines and proceed with those best suited to their interests and abilities. At the first-year level, Academic information management (AIM) and Academic literacy (ALL) are fundamental (compulsory) modules. In compiling their programmes, students have an extraordinarily wide choice.

See page 7 of this brochure or the alphabetical list of modules in the Faculty's Yearbook at www.up.ac.za/yearbooks/home. Students determine the focus of their studies (usually two majors are taken up to the third-year level), as well as the supporting subjects they decide to include in the programme.

- **First year:** Select four disciplines and take them for the full year (both semesters), plus one module of at least twelve credits.
- **Second year:** Decide which three of the four disciplines completed at the first-year level will be continued with for the full year.
- **Third year:** Select any two of the three disciplines completed at the second-year level and continue with them for the full year. Note that students need not decide on these two core disciplines at the beginning of their first year of study, but have the opportunity to familiarise themselves with them before deciding on the focus for their final year (and possibly for postgraduate studies).

Students should comply with this degree structure and will require at least 360 credits to graduate.

Specific disciplines from other faculties may be included in the Bachelor of Arts programme on the following conditions: Only two can be taken at first-year level and one of these can be continued with at second- and third-year level. Refer to the list on page 6 of this brochure for disciplines from other faculties included in the Bachelor of Arts curriculum. The admission requirements for these disciplines are discussed in the yearbooks of the faculties concerned.

Students who wish to continue with postgraduate studies in psychology at UP must include a research module such as RES 320, or an equivalent module, during their undergraduate studies to enable them to apply for selection into the Bachelor of Social Science Honours in Psychology. This is an additional module and not part of the degree structure requirement.



Structure of programme

Since the programme allows for two core disciplines, students have more than one option for postgraduate study. They therefore have an alternative, should they not comply with the selection requirements for postgraduate study in one of the disciplines. With good planning, students who complete the Bachelor of Arts programme have the same chance of being selected for postgraduate studies in a particular discipline as those who enrol for the more specialised programmes.

Bachelor of Social Work

This programme includes work-integrated learning and prepares graduates for a professional career in social work. Graduates learn to help people solve problems, promote social change and development, strengthen community cohesion and empower individuals and groups.

The programme equips students with the values, knowledge, skills and practical competencies needed to:

- uphold social justice and human rights;
- enhance the social functioning of individuals, families, groups and communities;
- promote sustainable communities and environments;
- advocate for the removal of structural causes of poverty, inequality, oppression, discrimination and social exclusion;
- apply developmental social work methods through providing preventative, protective, developmental and therapeutic support to individuals, families, groups organisations and communities;
- inform social work services to ensure the protection of those who are vulnerable, belong to high-risk groups and are unable to protect themselves;
- address social needs and issues in the South African social welfare policy and legislation contexts;
- influence and develop social policy; and
- inform research methods, designs and strategies.



Structure of programme

Core modules

Core modules include Social Work, Social Work Practice, Psychology, Criminology, Sociology, Business Management and Welfare Law.

Elective modules

Elective modules are selected from Anthropology (first, second and third-year levels), Psychology, Criminology and Sociology (on second and third-year levels).

Applicants are considered for conditional admission with a minimum APS of 30 based on Grade 11 results. Final admission is confirmed with a minimum APS of 28 in Grade 12 final results. Admission to the Social Work programme is initially based on school results. To continue in the programme, students must successfully complete departmental selection at the end of their first year. This process assesses academic performance and may include an aptitude test and interview. In terms of the Children's Act (2005), all registered student social workers have to complete Form 30 in Part B of the National Child Protection Register (NCPR). Bachelor of Arts specialising in Law

It aims to train students as law practitioners with a broader academic background. The programme also provides an alternative route to obtaining a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) and offers versatile training in both law and the social sciences or humanities.

Students gain improved insight into the extent, consequences, and handling of national and global issues. They are academically equipped for careers where research, decision-making and reporting on law-related issues are essential.

This is a full-time programme, with certain modules offered after hours.

Elective modules

At first-year level, three Bachelor of Arts subjects must be selected from the elective modules. At least one of these subjects must be a language. Two Bachelor of Arts subjects must be selected up to second year level, of which at least one must be a language; and one Bachelor of Arts subject must be selected up to third-year level.

Postgraduate studies

After completing a Bachelor of Arts specialising in Law degree, students can continue with a Bachelor of Laws or may register for an honours degree in the core discipline they chose in the humanities.



Students who are interested in the Bachelor of Arts specialising in Philosophy, Politics and Economics programme, but do not comply with the 5 required in Mathematics, but have an APS of 32, a 4 in Mathematics and a 5 in English, may be admitted to another degree programme for the first year. If they register for STC 110 and STC 122 in their first year of study and pass both modules, they will be allowed to apply for an internal transfer to the BA(PPE) programme in their second year of study. Please note that students are required to pass STC 110 in order to continue with STC 122.

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Structure of programme

First year

Core modules: Economics, Philosophy, Political Sciences and Statistics

Elective modules (Year-level 1):

- Choose any two-semester modules (one per semester) from the same discipline.
- If chosen from the Faculty of Economic and Management Sciences, the modules must total at least 20 credits.

Bachelor of Arts in Fine Arts

Bachelor of Arts in Fine Arts covers a broad spectrum of professional art practices. The two majors of the degree are the studio-based component of art practice, Fine arts (BKK) and Professional art practice (VIT), and a theoretical subject, Visual culture studies (VKK).

Bachelor of Arts in Fine Arts is a four-year programme that incorporates training in art practice, such as painting, sculpture, printmaking, drawing, new media, photography and art theory.

Bachelor of Arts specialising in Visual Studies

The Visual Studies programme, with visual culture studies as the main subject, allows students to explore the many exciting forms of visual images encountered every day. The programme aims to develop critical skills by guiding students in the analysis, interpretation, and evaluation of visual culture in both historical and contemporary contexts.

This programme focuses on theoretical aspects of visual culture, so applicants do not need any artistic skills.




This programme develops students' knowledge, skills and passion for the performing arts. It gives them opportunities to explore the academic, creative, artistic and practical aspects of the discipline.

Students gain hands-on experience by conceiving, directing and participating in a range of media, including theatre, TV, film and radio.

The programme covers the main areas of performance studies, including:

- Physical theatre
- Directing and performance
- Digital and new media studies
- Performing arts management
- Developmental and educational theatre and drama

Beyond skills training, the programme fosters an entrepreneurial mindset and helps students develop abilities such as:

- Strategic, analytical, critical and creative thinking
- Effective communication and teamwork
- Decision-making, planning and organisation
- Problem-solving and information processing
- Leadership and adaptability
- Time management and a strong work ethic

Structure of programme

The programme has the following major focal points:

- Live and Digital Performance Studies (SBT): Covers text analysis and performance, how scenography interacts with the body, foundational voice and movement techniques, digital media studies (including radio and TV presentation) and writing for stage and film.
- Theatre Studies (TNT and TNP): Allows students to integrate creative, conceptual and performance skills by conceiving, staging and performing theatre, film and TV work. TNP introduces basic acting techniques, improvisation, movement and voice approaches, and practical components in digital media, physical theatre, writing for stage and film, TV and radio presenting, stage and camera acting, directing and theatre-making.
- Drama and Film Studies (DFK): Teaches students the languages of drama and film, enabling them to read, interpret and understand the meanings and discourses in drama and film narratives.






